**Please help us protect this area by:**

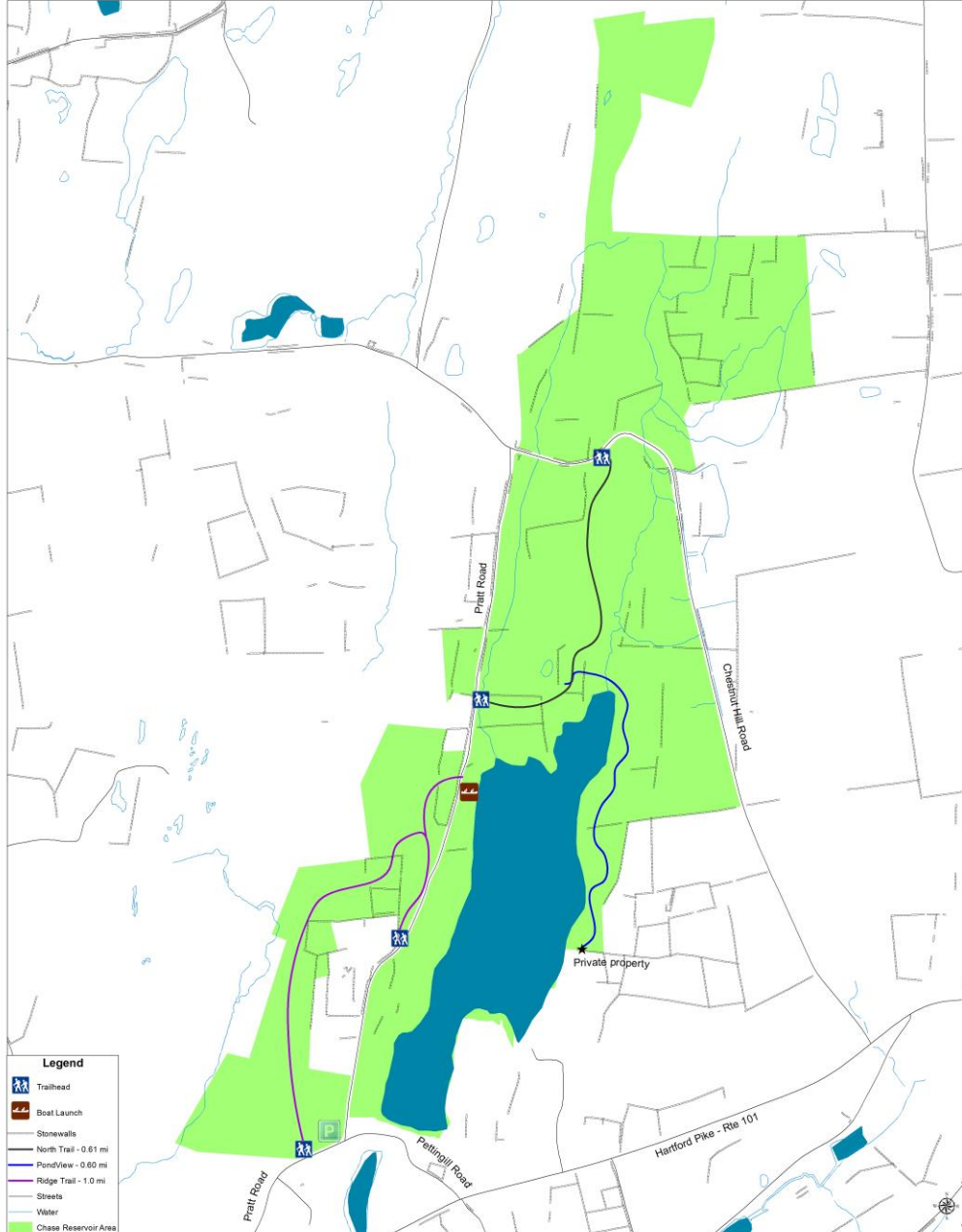
- not building fires or camping on the nature preserve

85 Pratt Road, Killingly

Chase Reservoir is a nature preserve owned by the Town of Killingly with a conservation easement held by the Wyndham Land Trust. The 365 acres are being preserved in their natural state for passive recreation, environmental education, wildlife habitat and ecosystem protection. The Connecticut Water Company donated this property in 2003 and continues to own the dam on Pettingill Road.



The 365-acre preserve consists of an 80-acre pond and 285 acres of woodland, grassland, streams, swamps, vernal pools, historic foundation, and managed woodcock habitat. Three hiking trails can be found here.

A one-mile loop trail through woodland beginning to the left of the parking area and ending at the unpaved Pratt Road which you can follow back to the parking lot.

A 0.6-mile trail begins at the gate on the right side of Pratt Road, past the boat launch. This trail goes through woodland and along the east side of the scenic reservoir.

Back track and then walk another 0.6-mile trail north to Chestnut Hill Road. You can retrace your steps or walk Chestnut Hill Road back to Pratt Road.
